ANNUAL REVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL SITUATION, 1995

Report of the Administrator

SUMMARY

The present report provides a review of the financial position of the United Nations Development Programme during 1995 and a balance sheet forecast for the years 1996 and 1997, and is supplemented by four addenda: the net flow of contributions by donor and recipient Governments; trust funds established by the Administrator; the Reserve for Field Accommodation; and proposed amendments to the UNDP Financial Regulations and Rules.

It also includes information provided in accordance with various Governing Council decisions:

82/36 (agency support cost flexibility arrangements);

83/5 (management and other support services); and

92/22 (requests for additional support costs)

The Executive Board may wish to: (a) note the reduction in voluntary contributions to UNDP core resources and call on donors to increase their contributions in light of the target for contributions established by the Executive Board; (b) note the build-up in the UNDP balance of general resources and the measures taken by the Administrator to address that matter; (c) suspend the application of the formula for determining the level of the Operational Reserve for 1996 only and retain the Reserve at its current level of \$200 million.

Additional items requiring attention by the Executive Board are included in the four addenda.

I. ANNUAL REVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL SITUATION

A. Overview of the financial situation

1. Introduction

1. The present report provides comprehensive financial information on UNDP core activities for the year 1995. Data concerning the full range of UNDP activities over the biennium 1994-1995, including all sources of funds administered by the Administrator, was contained in the annual report of the Administrator (DP/1996/18 and Add.4), submitted to the Executive Board at its annual session 1995.

2. The report is supplemented by the following addenda:

Net flow of contributions by donor and recipient Governments (DP/1996/28/Add.1), providing information concerning the flow of contributions to and payments from UNDP in respect of each participating Government;

Trust funds established by the Administrator (DP/1996/28/Add.2), providing summary information on all trust funds established by the Administrator;

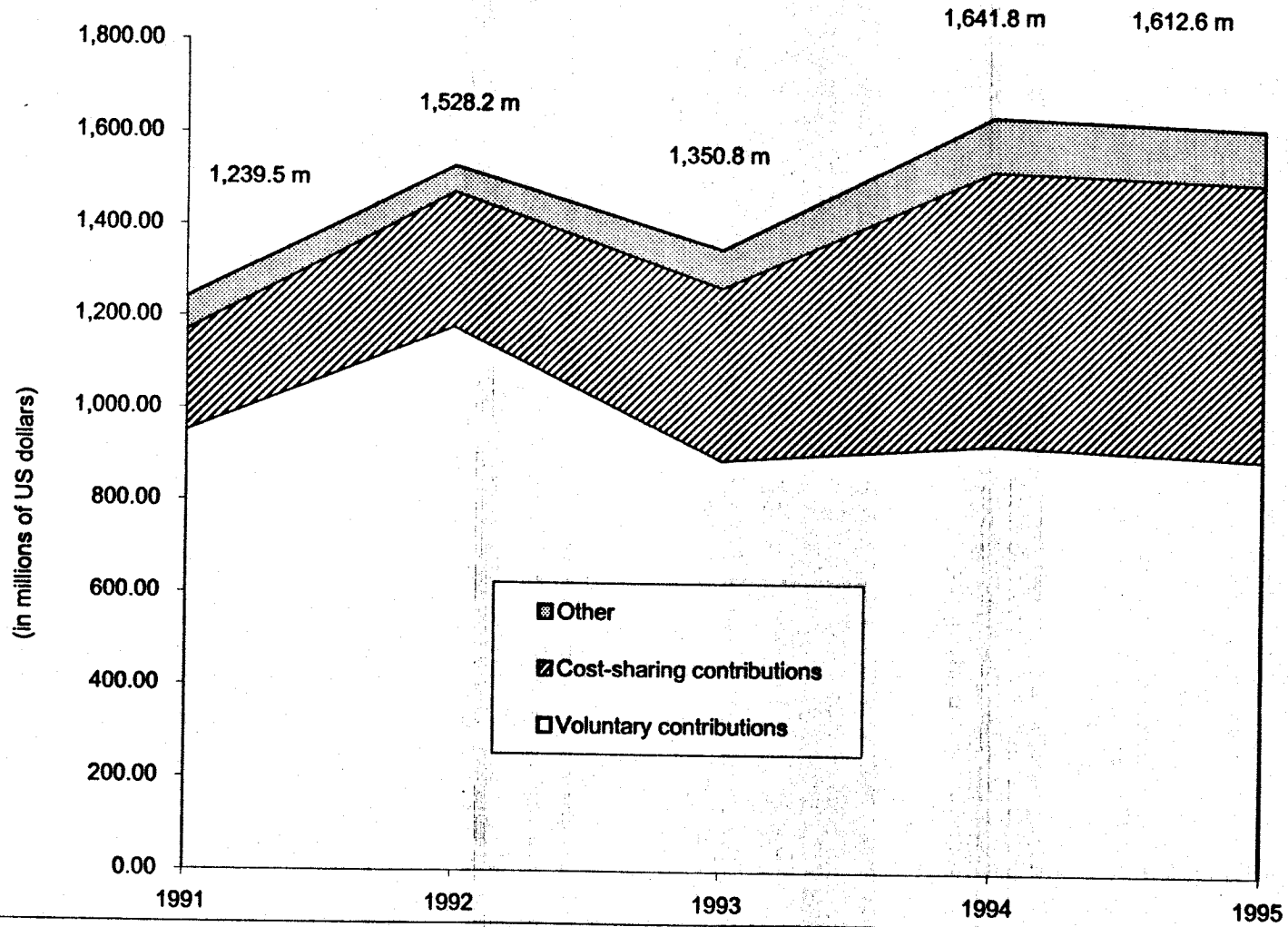
Reserve for Field Accommodation (DP/1996/28/Add.3), providing an update on the progress of the plan on the utilization of the Reserve;

Proposed amendments to the UNDP Financial Regulations and Rules (DP/1996/28/Add.4), with respect to the mobilization of resources by UNDP from non-governmental sources.

2. Income and expenditure

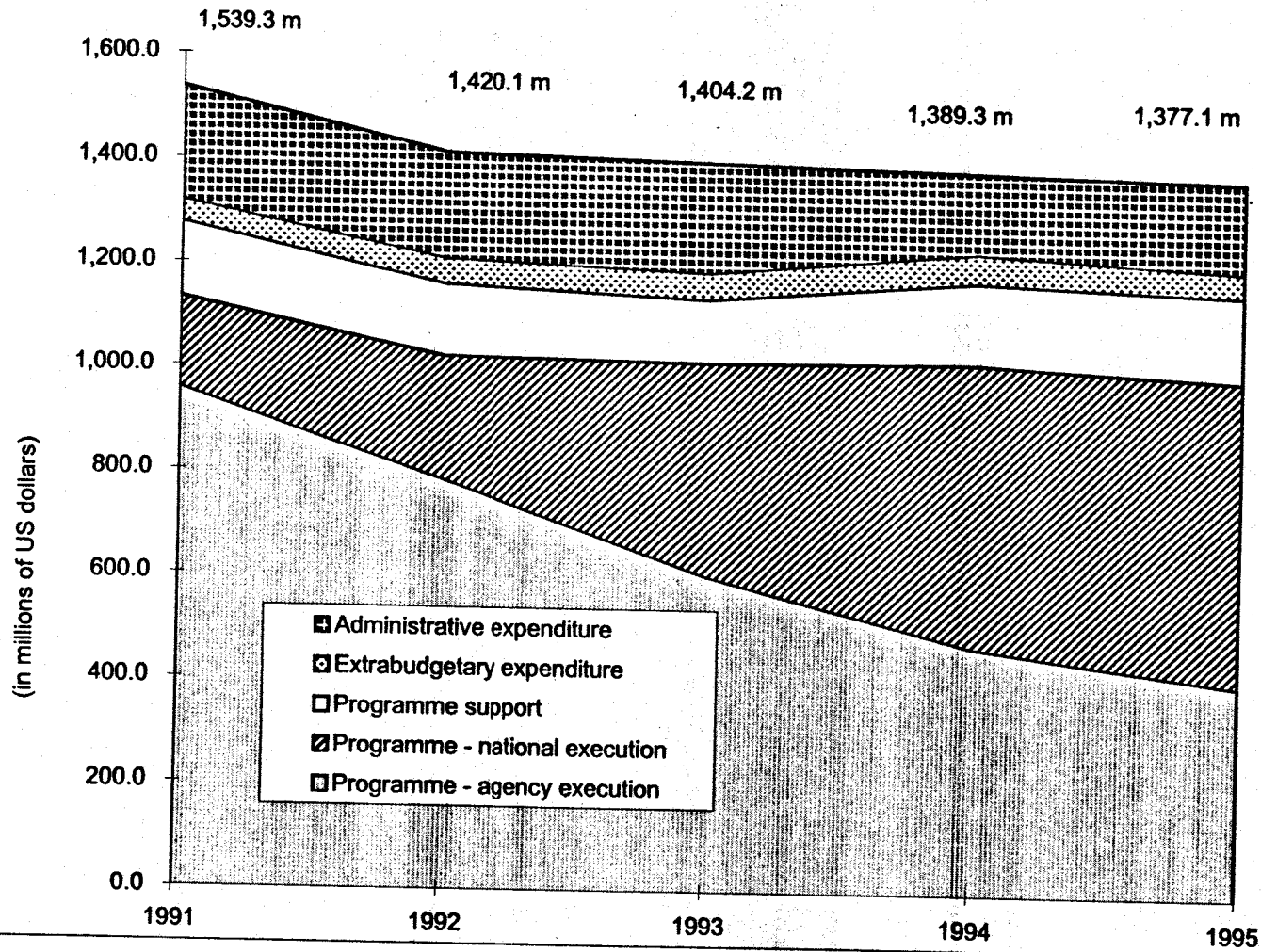
3. Overall 1995 income exceeded expenditure by \$223 million, compared to \$253 million in 1994. Total overall income for 1995 amounted to \$1,624 million, representing a decrease of \$18 million compared to 1994, as indicated in annex table 1. Figure 1 gives a short historical perspective on UNDP total income and its composition. Voluntary contributions to UNDP, before the application of the accounting linkage between voluntary contributions and government local office costs, declined slightly - from \$932 million in 1994 to \$903 million in 1995. The level of voluntary contributions, in dollar terms, was aided by a relatively weak dollar during the course of 1995. Overall, the United States dollar devalued by about 5 per cent. As of 31 December 1995, voluntary contributions pledged but unpaid amounted to \$37 million, as indicated in annex table 3.

4. After several years of rapid growth, cost-sharing income remained stable compared to 1994, growing by less than 1 per cent from \$596 million in 1994 to \$601 million in 1995. Within the cost-sharing account, government cost-sharing increased by \$26 million while third-party cost-sharing declined by \$21 million. The reduction in third-party cost-sharing is partly due to a shift from the cost-sharing modality to the trust fund modality by some major contributors because of legal requirements related to the payment of interest income earned on cost-sharing balances. The Executive Board will recall that the Administrator has taken steps to address the issue earlier this year through a revision to Financial Rule 104.14, which permits UNDP to redistribute interest income back to the cost-sharing donor. Additional information on cost-sharing contributions by donor countries may be found in annex tables 4 (a) and 4 (b). Outstanding cost-sharing contribution as at 31 December 1995 amounted to \$217 million, as shown in annex table 3.
5. Miscellaneous income rose from \$58 million in 1994 to \$76 million in 1995, an increase of \$18 million, most of which was due to improved interest earnings. This in turn resulted from somewhat higher interest yields in 1995 than 1994, combined with an increase in the size of the investment portfolio (see section I.B.).
6. Extrabudgetary income was reduced from the 1994 level of \$49 million to \$40 million solely because of the separation of UNOPS income from that of UNDP. Excluding UNOPS income from activities relating to trust funds and management services arrangements, which amounted to \$18 million in 1994, UNDP extrabudgetary income rose from an adjusted \$31 million in 1994 to almost \$40 million in 1995. The difference of \$9 million arises primarily from increases of \$6 million in programme and administrative support services provided by country offices; \$1 million in support services provided by UNDP to non-core activities and trust funds; and \$1 million in procurement services provided by IAPSO.
7. Total expenditure as indicated in annex table 1 and figure 2 (inclusive of cost-sharing) decreased by \$11 million, from \$1,389 million in 1994 to \$1,379 million in 1995. Programme expenditure declined to \$994 million in 1995 from \$1,020 million in 1994. Within this amount, IPF expenditure declined by \$51 million from \$489 million in 1994 to \$438 million in 1995, a reduction of 10 per cent. SPR expenditure also declined by 6 per cent, from \$43 million to \$41 million.
8. Cost-sharing expenditure increased by 6 per cent, from \$475 million in 1994 to \$504 million in 1995. Cost-sharing expenditure represented slightly less than 51 per cent of total programme delivery (see annex table 5). Of the total amount, \$490 million represents cost-sharing related to IPF-financed programmes and projects while \$13 million was in conjunction with SPR-financed projects. Annex table 4 (a) provides a country-by-country analysis of the 1995 income from cost-sharing contributions and annex table 4 (b) provides additional information on income received under third-party cost-sharing arrangements.

9. A breakdown of programme expenditures per executing bodies and source of funds is provided in annex table 5. Figure 2 depicts all expenditures broken down by execution modality (i.e., national execution and agency execution) as well as other expenditure categories, in contrast to the breakdown given in annex table 1, where expenditure is presented by source of funds. Accordingly, programme delivery under national execution continued to grow, with expenditure of \$588 million in 1995, an increase of \$41 million or 7 per cent from 1994 levels. In turn, UNOPS and agency execution declined in total by \$67 million or 14 per cent, of which UNOPS execution was mostly unchanged at \$138 million in 1995 versus \$137 million in 1994, while agency execution declined from \$336 million to \$268 million, or 20 per cent.

10. UNDP annual net budget expenditure for core activities in 1995 increased by \$18 million (12 per cent from \$155 million to \$173 million), as expected for the second year of the biennium. With a total of \$328 million, the 1994-1995 biennial budget expenditure for core activities were maintained at the 1992-1993 level in nominal terms. This reflects the achievement of the 1994-1995 biennial budget strategy, which incorporated significant reductions in real terms to contain overall costs in nominal terms.

3. Assets and liabilities

11. A summary of the balance sheet is presented in annex table 2. On the assets side, cash holdings decreased by \$10 million (28 per cent) to \$26 million worldwide, due to a reduction in cash balances held at country office bank accounts. Total investments increased 25 per cent from \$1,240 million in 1994, to \$1,552 million in 1995. Investments of general resources increased 46 per cent, from \$279 million in 1994 to \$407 million in 1995. Investments attributable to subsidiary programmes increased significantly by 24 per cent from \$760 million to \$945 million. This balance is composed of the pooled funds representing the unexpended resources on non-core activities, such as management services agreements, trust funds, cost-sharing. The status of the Operational Reserve (currently set at \$200 million) is presented in section I.C.

12. Operating funds provided to Governments for the execution of UNDP projects increased 41 per cent from \$61 million to \$87 million, reflecting the continuing trend to higher national execution expenditure, while operating funds provided to executing agencies increased by 39 per cent, from \$63 million to \$87 million, despite the decrease in agency execution.

13. Assets under the Reserve for Field Accommodation amounted to \$54.8 million in 1995. An in-depth review of the activities under the reserve is found in document DP/1996/28/Add.3.

14. On the liabilities side, accounts payable remained stable at \$130 million, compared to \$129 million in 1994.

15. The net balance of management service agreements decreased by \$7 million (8 per cent), from \$82 million to \$75 million (see annex table 7).

16. Amounts due to trust funds administered by UNDP increased by \$80 million (28 per cent), from \$281 million in 1994 to \$361 million in 1995, reflecting the continued growth of the trust fund modality, as further detailed in document DP/1996/28/Add.2.

17. The balance of general resources increased to a level of \$462 million at the end of 1995, from \$311 million in 1994. This translates in practice largely into investments held by UNDP (\$407 million) that represent the liquid position for general resources. Section I.4 below analyses the recent developments in programme delivery, the main cause for the high level of liquidity held by UNDP. The balance must also be viewed in the perspective of UNDP operational realities. For example, the UNDP monthly average of core expenditures amounts to approximately \$70 million. On this basis, the balance of resources represents about seven months of expenditures and liquid investments of about six months. This balance is a "snapshot" at the last day of 1995. Since the UNDP cash inflow of contributions tends to be much greater towards the end of the year than at the beginning, there is a natural inflation of the balances of resources at year-end. For example, as of 1 June 1996, only 26 per cent of anticipated pledged voluntary contributions to UNDP for the year have actually been received, i.e., \$220 million, equivalent to three months of core expenditures.

4. Financial assessment

18. The build-up in liquid investments is the direct result of declining delivery levels. While this is considered a temporary situation, which should improve immediately as a result of the measures initiated by the Administrator as described in the paragraphs below, it is noted that the balance of liquid investments has increased from \$195 million as of end 1991 to \$407 million as of end of 1995. However, it is also noted that outstanding commitments of \$760 million exist against this amount, which are not reflected in annex table 2, of which \$700 million relate to programme commitments and \$60 million to administrative commitments, excluding the biennial budget.

19. If 1996 income and expenditure forecasts as reflected in annex table 1 are realized, then approximately 98 per cent of combined IPF and SPR entitlements, totalling \$3,490 million, will be programmed and 88 per cent spent at the end of the fifth cycle. While these figures are lower than in previous cycles, they should not be construed as indicative of future trends, but rather as a temporary phenomenon, reflecting UNDP efforts to reposition itself to become a more responsive and effective organization as it adapts to current development realities and challenges. In doing so, UNDP must take into account a combination of recently emerging factors that are both complex and interrelated. Several of the major factors are cited below.

20. The significant increase in national execution/implementation during the fifth cycle, while fully in line with General Assembly and Executive Board mandates, has resulted in a build-up and delivery of programme resources that have been slower than anticipated, primarily as a result of changing ownership responsibilities and the financial mix of project inputs. This is viewed as a positive development in that increased usage of UNDP-financed national inputs is

less costly and in most cases more responsive to the development needs of programme countries.

21. Similarly, the programme approach, while more relevant and responsive to the established developmental priorities of Governments, as envisaged by the General Assembly and the Executive Board, has initially been found to require longer lead times for design and formulation. This has often resulted in spurts of approvals, rather than gradual build-ups, resulting in uneven and, at present, understated delivery patterns.

22. The introduction of change in UNDP programming priorities and structure as reflected in Executive Board decisions 94/14 and 95/23 has clearly begun to enhance UNDP ability to serve programme countries more effectively and responsively, particularly in areas where demonstrable comparative advantages exist. However, as UNDP transits from traditional programming directions and the cycle structure to the new programming arrangements, the resulting programme reorientations and adaptations to new guidelines have created temporary slow-downs in the rates of programme build-up and delivery.

23. Sixteen programme countries have been identified as accounting for more than 30 per cent of total fifth cycle IPF and SPR entitlements, and 75 per cent of the corresponding estimated underdelivery therein. Based upon the feedback received directly from the country offices concerned, reductions in programme build-up and delivery were largely attributed to one or more of the factors cited above.

24. The Administrator has taken a number of critical measures to improve the future outlook of the Programme. He has authorized the borrowing of \$82 million in programme resources against the next programming period on a case-by-case basis to enable programmes to deliver resources during 1996 in excess of their fifth cycle resource bases. He also wrote to all Resident Representatives expressing deep concern about the increasing potential for considerable underdelivery of the cycle's programme resources. In parallel, he initiated a series of special reviews with the Regional Bureaux under the leadership of the Associate Administrator to analyse individual country programming levels, with particular emphasis on underprogrammed countries. This resulted in the identification of the 16 programmes referred to in paragraph 23 above. The Associate Administrator has corresponded directly with the Resident Representatives in these programme countries and continues to monitor their situations closely. In turn, the Regional Bureaux continue to monitor all individual programmes while conducting special programming exercises to further diagnose and remedy country-specific impediments to programme build-up and delivery.

25. At the end of 1995, the Administrator issued part one of the guidelines for the implementation of the successor programming arrangements. Included in these guidelines is a section on start-up and phasing-in procedures, which addresses the current need to release resources from the next programming period for advanced programming purposes in order to generate the early build-up of programmes that are in line with new UNDP directives. To date, \$746 million of resources from the next programming period have been released for advanced programming purposes. It is expected that these resources will provide the

initial forward programming momentum necessary for UNDP as a whole to meet future programme approval and delivery targets.

26. Finally, it should be noted that comprehensive plans of action outlining strategies for achieving future programme approval and delivery levels have been prepared by each Regional Bureau at the request of the UNDP Executive Committee. The Executive Committee, established in March 1996 as the senior management body dealing with issues most critical to the overall management of UNDP, is closely monitoring all matters pertinent to the successful planning, programming and delivery of UNDP core programme resources.

B. Portfolio management

27. The UNDP investment portfolio is held primarily in the currencies of its major donors, and is composed of commingled funds from various sources invested in bank time deposits, bonds and other risk-averse instruments. Movements in interest and exchange rates are consequently the factors most directly effecting the value of the investment portfolio in United States dollar terms. The weighted average size of the investment portfolio increased from \$905 million in 1994 to \$1.3 billion in 1995.

28. Interest rates generally declined through 1995 in the industrialized countries. From a strategic perspective, UNDP had placed investments for maturities over a longer period in order to avoid reduced income to the greatest extent possible. As a result, the average interest yield increased from 5.1 per cent in 1994 to 6.1 per cent in 1995. This increase in interest yield, combined with the growth in the size of the overall portfolio, resulted in an increase of \$35 million in interest income earned year over year, from \$46 million in 1994 to \$81 million in 1995. As noted above, the investment portfolio is managed on a commingled basis, and consequently interest earnings of \$21 million were transferred to the cost-sharing (\$6.8 million) trust funds (\$8.9 million) and management services (\$5.2 million) accounts, leaving \$60 million for UNDP core resources.

29. The portfolio also benefited from a general weakness in the United States dollar over 1995. Measured against the trade-weighted index of the currencies of 10 major trading partners of the United States, the United States dollar declined by 11 per cent between January and April, before recovering by 6 per cent to finish 5 per cent lower for the year. As a result, the value of the non-dollar investments held in the UNDP portfolio realized a gain of \$22 million.

30. Losses on exchange amounting to \$6.4 million in 1995 (versus a gain of \$2.4 million in 1994) resulted from the conversion of currencies for operational needs and the effects of the devaluation of operational currencies held at country offices (see section I.D), including the accumulation of non-convertible currencies.

31. As shown in the following table, the combined yield on the portfolio in 1995 was 7.8 per cent as compared to 6.5 per cent in 1994 (based on the daily

weighted average portfolio of investments, and the interest and exchange gains/losses related to the investment portfolio):

C. Status of the Operational Reserve

32. In accordance with Governing Council decision 90/44 of 22 June 1990, the level of the Operational Reserve is determined as 20 per cent of estimated contributions or expenditure, whichever is higher, rounded to the nearest \$10 million. On the basis of this formula, the level of the Operational Reserve was retained at \$200 million for 1995, which is equivalent to 2.9 months of average 1995 expenditures. There has been no change in the composition of the currencies of the Reserve, which are as follows: United States dollars - \$110 million; European currency units - equivalent of \$70 million; Japanese yen - equivalent of \$10 million; and Swiss francs - equivalent of \$10 million. On the basis of current forecasts for income and expenditure, the required level of the Operational Reserve would decline to \$170 million for 1996, and be restored to \$200 million in 1997.

33. In light of the expectation that the Operational Reserve would be reduced for one year only, the Administrator recommended that the Executive Board suspend the application of the formula for 1996 and retain the Operational Reserve at a level of \$200 million.

D. Utilization of accumulated non-convertible currencies

34. UNDP holdings of accumulated non-convertible currencies amounted to the equivalent of \$13 million as at 31 December 1995 as compared to \$15 million one year earlier. The Cuban peso remains the sole currency designated under this category. During 1995, the amount held in Cuban pesos increased by 1.8 million as an additional contribution was received in 1995. However, the United States dollar value of these holdings declined as a result of the official devaluation of the Cuban peso in November 1995.

35. In connection with Financial Regulations 4.5 and 4.8, UNDP would also like to bring to the attention of the Executive Board that, although the Myanmar kyats and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea wons are not officially designated as accumulating non-convertible currencies, there has been a build-up of substantial balances in these currencies. This is due to the fact that the level of disbursements is not enough to utilize holdings of these currencies in

a reasonable time-frame. As at 31 December 1995, holdings of Myanmar kyats and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea wons totalled the equivalent of \$3.1 and \$0.7 million, respectively, which represents an increase of \$0.16 and \$0.2 million, respectively, in the course of 1995.

E. Financial forecasts

36. The forecasts for the years 1996 and 1997 shown in annex tables 1 and 2 with respect to the income and the balance sheet statements reflect the programme delivery targets established by the Administrator as well as other estimates as at the date of preparation of the present report. Under the successor programming arrangements, which will be implemented starting in 1997, the reporting of programme expenditure will be based upon the new TRAC system. For the sake of comparability in this report, programme expenditure forecasts for TRAC have been translated into the old programme expenditure formats in annex table 1.

37. It will be noted that there is a significant reduction in the value of voluntary contributions estimated to be received in 1996. Current estimates amount to \$874 million, inclusive of \$22 million in contributions pledged in 1995, down from \$903 million in 1995. At the same time, the strengthening of the United States dollar over the early course of 1996 has also had a negative impact on the value of voluntary contributions received and/or pending for 1996. The rise in the value of the United States dollar from January to end May resulted in a loss of value equal to some \$30 million from the original estimated total of contributions for the year.

38. The Administrator calls to the attention of the Executive Board that although the forecast for voluntary contributions for 1997 has been retained in annex table 1 at the \$1 billion target established by the Administrator, the achievement of that level requires a significant increase in the current pledged contributions of major donors.

39. In working out a strategy for programming and delivery of the programming resources for the period 1996-1999, and in order to establish annual programme expenditure targets for this period, the Administrator has been guided by two sets of considerations: (a) factors relating to the end of the cycle and the adoption of new programming arrangements; (b) programmatic factors resulting from implementation of various governing body decisions in recent years.

40. A key factor is, of course, the estimate of resources for the period 1997-1999. While the Executive Board has established a target for voluntary contributions for this period of \$3.3 billion, the Board will recall that the Administrator indicated during the first regular session 1996 that, based on the best estimates available, he intends for operational purposes to assume a resource base of \$3 billion for this period.

41. The 1996 and 1997 forecasts contained in the present report indicate that the UNDP balance of resources and liquid investments show a decrease in 1996 respectively to \$370 million and \$304 million, from \$462 million and \$407 million in 1995, and to \$342 million and \$281 million in 1997. It is

assumed that the Reserve will be maintained at the existing level, as recommended in paragraph 33. Based on programme delivery targets for 1998 and 1999, it is anticipated that the level of liquid investments will decrease to about \$150 million by end of 1999.

II. AGENCY SUPPORT COSTS: FLEXIBILITY ARRANGEMENTS

42. Support-cost flexibility arrangements have been regulated since 1992 by Governing Council decision 91/32 of 25 June 1991, in which the Council approved support-cost flexibility arrangements for eligible executing agencies that are autonomous organizations within the United Nations system and whose annual delivery level of UNDP-funded projects does not exceed \$24 million. In annex 3 of the decision, the Council established the variable rates for flexibility payments, ranging from the maximum of 9 per cent for programme delivery under \$8 million to zero for delivery exceeding \$24 million.

43. Annex table 6 (a) shows a comparison of forecast and actual amounts relating to the delivery of UNDP-financed projects and associated support costs for the eight agencies that were expected to be eligible for support-cost flexibility in 1995. The forecast of approximately \$4.1 million for total support-cost reimbursement to those agencies was based on detailed data submitted by agencies in 1995 for that year. By comparison, actual reimbursement for 1995 amounted to approximately \$3.3 million and represents an average of 22 per cent of project expenditure for these agencies.

44. Annex table 6 (b) provides data on expected programme delivery for the agencies that are likely to be eligible for flexibility payments in 1996 and estimated support-cost reimbursement to them. For these agencies taken as a group, UNDP is expected to provide support costs at an average of 22 per cent of the estimated programme delivery, as compared with the standard 13 per cent for the agencies retaining the old regime of support-cost reimbursement. The table further indicates that the reimbursement to these agencies, including flexibility payments, is expected to finance an average of 33 per cent of the total costs that agencies expect to incur in support of UNDP-financed projects. The remaining 67 per cent will be met by agencies from sources other than UNDP.

III. RESERVE FOR FIELD ACCOMMODATION

45. The status of the Reserve for Field Accommodation (RFA) as at 31 December 1995 is given in addendum 3 to the present document (DP/1996/28/Add.3).

IV. MANAGEMENT AND OTHER SUPPORT SERVICES

46. In its decisions 83/5 of 24 June 1983 and 84/35 of 29 June 1984, the Governing Council authorized the Administrator to provide, at the request of recipient Governments, management and other support services. The Administrator provides such services through the United Nations Office for Project Services.

47. The Governing Council also decided (decision 88/54) that a report on the status of management services be submitted every two years beginning in 1990. Pursuant to that decision, the latest report of the Administrator on the status of management services covered the biennium 1992-1993 and was submitted to the Executive Board at its third regular session 1994 (DP/1994/56). In its decision 92/39, the Executive Board decided to review the status of MSAs triennially; therefore, a comprehensive report on the status of MSAs covering the years from 1994 to 1996 will be submitted in 1997. The present report covers 1995 only.
48. Programmes benefiting from management services provided by UNDP through UNOPS continue to be funded by multilateral lending institutions (the World Bank, IDB, IFAD), by individual donor countries and by recipient countries themselves. As of the end of 1995, UNOPS was providing services under 107 active agreements with budgets totalling \$679.3 million (including management fees of \$32.5 million). Expenditures in 1995 totalled \$136.9 million including MSA fees of \$5.8 million. The foregoing does not include IFAD loans and the Programme of Assistance to the Palestinian People, which had loan drawdowns of \$106.6 million and expenditures of \$2.4 million respectively. A schedule of agreements entered into or amended in 1995 is provided in annex tables 7 (a) and 7 (b) respectively.
49. Ten new MSAs with funds from Development Banks valued at \$90.0 million were entered into during 1995. In addition, the budgets of 17 existing agreements were amended for a net increase of \$5.9 million, as follows: 13 agreements were increased by \$8.4 million while 4 agreements were reduced by \$2.5 million. With the addition of the new agreements, there were, as of 31 December 1995, 49 active projects financed by IDB, IFAD, the World Bank and IDA loans with budgets of \$299.1 million (including \$15.7 million for management fees).
50. Bilateral funding worth \$133.1 million accounted for 18 new MSAs in 1995. In addition, the budgets of 29 existing agreements, including 25 funded by the Government of Japan were amended, resulting in a net increase of \$9.1 million, thus bringing the total to 45 active projects with budgets totalling \$347.2 million (including management fees of \$14.7 million). The new projects represent 11 agreements for the procurement of commodities financed by Japan, with budgets totalling \$116.1 million; and 7 agreements initiated with funding from the Australian Development Assistance Bureau, Canada, Denmark, Italy and Switzerland, with budgets totalling \$17.0 million. The new agreements initiated with Japanese funding accounted for 87 per cent of the total value of new bilateral agreements.
51. Government funding was made available for two new MSAs with budgets totalling \$1.4 million. With the addition of these new agreements and an increase by \$2.8 million, due to amendments to five existing agreements, the number of projects financed by Governments themselves as at 31 December 1995 has reached a total of 13 active projects, with budgets totalling \$33.0 million (including management fees of \$2.1 million).
52. The IFAD portfolio also expanded by 10 new projects during 1995, with loans totalling SDRs 73.7 million and one grant of 150 million Belgian francs. For the IFAD programme, UNOPS undertakes loan administration and project supervision but does not disburse the loan amounts. The loan proceeds are disbursed to the

borrowers directly by IFAD upon verification and authorization by UNOPS. The only exceptions to this procedure are the direct management of five IFAD MSAs signed as at 31 December 1995 for \$14.5 million. Loan drawdowns during 1995 totalled \$106.6 million. As of 31 December 1995, a total of 97 IFAD projects were under UNOPS supervision in 53 countries.

V. REQUEST FOR ADDITIONAL SUPPORT-COST REIMBURSEMENT
FROM THE INTERNATIONAL MARITIME ORGANIZATION AND
THE WORLD INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY ORGANIZATION

53. UNDP has received requests for additional support-cost reimbursements from the International Maritime Organization and the World Intellectual Property Organization amounting to Swiss francs 65,785 and 63,065 respectively as a result of the significant appreciation of the Swiss franc vis-à-vis the United States dollar during 1994. These requests are in full conformity with Governing Council decision 92/22, in which the Council established a mechanism for mitigating the adverse impact of exchange rate fluctuations on support costs. The Administrator has authorized payments accordingly.

VI. EXECUTIVE BOARD ACTION

54. The Executive Board may wish to:

1. Note the reduction in voluntary contributions to UNDP core resources and call on donors to increase their contributions in light of the target for contributions established by the Executive Board;
2. Note the build-up in the UNDP balance of general resources and the measures taken by the Administrator to address the matter;
3. Suspend the application of the formula for determining the level of the Operational Reserve for 1996 only and retain the Reserve at its current level of \$200 million.
