PROGRAMME IMPLEMENTATION

ASSISTANCE TO NATIONAL LIBERATION MOVEMENTS RECOGNIZED
BY THE ORGANIZATION OF AFRICAN UNITY (OAU)

Report of the Administrator

Summary

At its twenty-sixth session in June 1979, the Governing Council decided to convert the \$7.0 million advance from the programme reserve, which was approved at its twenty-fifth session, to an increase in the IPF, and, also, added another \$7.5 million to the IPF, raising it to a total of \$20.5 million for the 1977-1981 programming cycle. It is expected that the level of programme delivery for 1979 will be \$5.7 million or 63 per cent over the previous year. Furthermore, it is projected that all IPF resources programmed for this cycle will have been expended by the end of 1981.

While NLM projects in Zimbabwe will cease to be financed under the NLM IPF after the end of the current programming cycle, it appears that the stalled negotiations for Namibia's independence and the political situation in South Africa will require that additional NLM resources be earmarked for the third IPF cycle. The Council is being requested to take note of this report.

I. DEVELOPMENTS SINCE THE LAST SESSION OF THE GOVERNING COUNCIL

. During the period under review, assistance to the national liberation movements (NLMs) continued cautiously, taking into account the need to monitor closely the financial situation of that programme. Commitments for NLM projects in the year 1979 amounted to \$6,704,419.

. The Governing Council of UNDP, at its twenty-sixth session in June 1979, noting that the original IPF for the NLMs as well as the \$7.5 million advance from the programme reserve approved at its twenty-fifth session were fully committed, decided to convert the advance to an increase in the IPF and, also, added another \$7.5 million to the IPF, raising it to a total of \$20.5 million for the 1977-1981 programming cycle. ^{1/} For the current status of the NLM resources, both Trust Fund and IPF, please note the following table.

A breakdown of the above table, by liberation movements, can be seen in annex I and, by project, in annexes II and III.

3. The Council will recall that in order to review the relations between the OAU and the organizations within the United Nations system, as well as the assistance given to the liberation movements, as required in General Assembly resolution 33/27, UNDP convened in June 1979 a meeting of these organizations with the OAU and the national liberation movements. The main conclusions of the meeting were:

(a) The OAU would send a formal appeal to the executing bodies of all United Nations system Agencies to allocate more funds under their regular budgets to allow implementation of additional projects benefiting NLMs;

(b) Greater flexibility should be exercised in the future in the implementation of projects;

(c) A meeting with NLMs should be organized by UNDP toward the end of 1979 to determine the assistance required by the NLMs for 1980. This meeting was not convened because the General Assembly approved a resolution in November requesting the Secretary-General to arrange for the meeting to take place in Africa before the thirty-fifth session of the General Assembly. Therefore, the responsibility for calling this meeting now rests with the United Nations.

(a) Developments in Zimbabwe

4. The preparation of an economic and social survey of Zimbabwe, approved formally by UNDP in 1978, under a project requested by the Patriotic Front and executed by the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD), was concluded in February 1980. The study was conducted under the direction of a chief economist, Professor M. A. Onitiri, Director of the Nigeria Institute of Social and Economic Research in Ibaden. The final report was formally presented to the two co-leaders of the Patriotic Front in February 1980.
5. Following the agreement reached at the Lancaster House negotiations in London, under the direction of the Government of the United Kingdom, elections took place in Southern Rhodesia on 27, 28 and 29 February, after a brief transition period during which the countries resumed the status of a British colony. As a result of the elections, Mr. Robert Mugabe, co-leader of the Patriotic Front (ZANU), became Prime Minister of Zimbabwe.
6. The Governing Council of UNDP, at its meeting in February 1980, decided to establish an IPF for Zimbabwe for the remainder of the 1977-1981 planning cycle in the amount of \$5.6 million. Also, the Council decided that the IPF for NLMs may continue to be used to finance 1980 activities of ongoing NLM projects related to Zimbabwe. 2/

(b) Developments in Namibia

7. Lack of progress in negotiations concerning the granting of independence to Namibia has led UNDP to continue its co-operation with the South West Africa People's Organization (SWAPO) and with the Council of Namibia as heretofore. As a result of the agreement reached between UNDP and the Office of the Commissioner for Namibia, UNDP has managed the over-all implementation of the Nationhood Programme for Namibia during the past year. Ten projects became operational. Of these, three projects are financed by the Namibia IPF.

II. ASSISTANCE TO THE PATRIOTIC FRONT OF ZIMBABWE

8. During the year 1979, assistance to the Patriotic Front continued through a number of ongoing projects which were listed in the report of the Administrator to the twenty-sixth session of the Governing Council (DP/362). These projects covered the fields of education and training, health and economic development and planning (see annex III to the present report, pages 1 and 2).

9. In addition, six new projects were approved in 1979 for a total of \$686,575. (For a breakdown of cost by project, see annex III, page 2). These projects are:

PAF/78/011 - Public Administration Training Programme

PAF/79/001 - Civil Aviation Training

PAF/79/002 - Transportation of Students

PAF/79/003 - Goods Transport

PAF/79/004 - Self-reliant Food Production

PAF/79/005 - Training of Aircraft Mechanics

10. Project PAF/78/011 - Public Administration Training Programme was designed to provide one-year training courses in administration, which would give students practical experience integrated with relevant theory.

11. Project PAF/79/001 - Civil Aviation Training. This project, approved for \$62,800 for a duration of two years, had as its original objective to train a group of five students in aircraft maintenance at Ethiopian Airlines. An expansion of the project to include 28 more students in aircraft maintenance and 7 in aircraft management was recently approved. The total revised cost of the project now stands at \$362,560.

12. PAF/79/002 - Transportation of Students. This project's objective is to finance the transportation of 90 Zimbabweans to Denmark to undergo training in various vocational and occupational fields before returning to Mozambique.

13. PAF/79/003 - Goods Transport. The main purpose of this project was to purchase a truck to assist the Patriotic Front (ZAPU) in transporting goods, such as foodstuffs, medical supplies, clothing, blankets, etc. from Dar-es-Salaam, United Republic of Tanzania to Zambia.

14. PAF/78/004 - Self-reliant Food Production. The aim of this project is to help establish a chicken farm with an eventual capacity of 10,000 layers and broilers and to promote other activities in the field of animal husbandry.

15. PAF/79/005 - Training of Aircraft Mechanics. The project will train a group of 10 Zimbabweans in aircraft maintenance, to enable them to service and maintain the civil aircraft in Zimbabwe.

16. As mentioned in paragraph 4, project PAF/78/010 - Macroeconomic and Social Survey has been completed.

III. ASSISTANCE TO SWAPO AND THE COUNCIL FOR NAMIBIA

17. The IPF of the NLMs continued supporting the projects that were indicated in the Administrator's report to the Council last year (see annex IV to the present report). The IPF for Namibia continued supporting the Institute for Namibia and eight pre-independence projects chosen from the Nationhood Programme for UNDP financing. In addition, one of the Namibia Nationhood projects, SWP/78/004, Participation of Women in Development, is being financed from the NLM IPF. For the current status of the Namibia IPF resources and commitments, please note the following table.

(a) Assistance to SWAPO

18. Project SWP/77/001 - Postal and Telecommunications Training, received an additional amount of \$513,500 for activities through 1979. The project, however, has been revised and extended for one more year, with no increase in funds except for \$90,000 needed to accommodate all the students (129) presented by SWAPO. These additional funds will most probably be supplied through the United Nations Commissioner's Office for Namibia, Lusaka.

19. Project SWP/78/001 - Training in Self-help Housing was executed by the United Nations, but due to the nature of the training it was transferred to UNCHS/HABITAT effective January 1979 and renumbered SWP/78/101. The total amount approved is now \$138,000 for the training of 25 students in planning of physical layout of settlements and in organizing construction of shelters under conditions of limited resources in remote areas, in participating in squatter upgrading and, in general, in familiarizing them with simple building techniques, water supply, drainage systems and waste disposal.

20. The other projects were continued with the objectives indicated in last year's report and with the same budgets.

(b) Assistance to the Council for Namibia

21. A detailed description of the pre-independence projects approved for UNDP financing from the Nationhood Programme for Namibia was given in last year's report to the Council. Indications concerning the present status of these projects will be given to the Council in the oral presentation of this report.

IV. ASSISTANCE TO ANC AND PAC OF SOUTH AFRICA

22. During the year 1979, UNDP continued to assist the two South African liberation movements recognized by the OAU: the African National Congress of South Africa (ANC) and the Pan Africanist Congress of Azania (PAC).

(a) African National Congress of South Africa

23. The three projects which were mentioned in last year's report have been progressing satisfactorily, (see annex III to the present report, p. 3).

24. Project ANC/78/001 - Assistance to Self-help Community Development was transferred from the United Nations to UNCHS/HABITAT and renumbered as ANC/78/101.

25. A preparatory assistance project ANC/79/001 - Multicomponent Assistance was approved in 1979 for a total amount of \$15,000. The objective of this preparatory assistance was to review the existing training facilities at Morogoro and assess the need for additional facilities related to basic education, health, vocational training and basic agricultural activities. This preparatory phase has led to the design of a large-scale project for promoting the development of Solomon Mahlangu Freedom College (SOMAFCO), which is currently in the process of being formally approved.

(b) Pan Africanist Congress of Azania

26. The three projects that were mentioned in last year's report continued progressing satisfactorily, (see annex III to the present report, p. 4).

27. Project PAC/78/002 - Construction Assistance was transferred to UNCHS/HABITAT and renumbered PAC/78/102.

28. Project PAC/79/001 - Self-reliance in Food Production was approved in 1979 for a total of \$297,800. The project aims to make the transit settlers of the PAC Centre in Bagamoyo self-reliant in food production, to the greatest possible extent, by training them in farming techniques and by providing requisite equipment and implements.

V. PROJECTS GIVING ASSISTANCE TO NATIONAL LIBERATION MOVEMENTS
 OF VARIOUS COUNTRIES

29. A number of projects designed to provide assistance simultaneously to several national liberation movements have continued their implementation as planned, (see annex III to the present report, p. 4).

VI. REPRESENTATION OF NLMs IN THE GOVERNING COUNCIL OF UNDP

30. Project NLM/78/001 provided for the representation of NLMs in the UNDP Governing Council sessions. Representatives of the Patriotic Front, SWAPO, ANC and PAC of South Africa were invited. Some representatives of these liberation movements attended the February 1980 meeting of the Governing Council.

VII. FINANCIAL SITUATION OF THE PROGRAMME
 AND FUTURE REQUIREMENTS

31. The financial situation of the programme can be seen in tables 1 and 2. Even though the NLM IPF shows an uncommitted amount of \$6,282,844, a number of project extensions have been requested by the liberation movements. Of those, the following have been agreed to in principle and the project documents will be forwarded to UNDP headquarters for formal approval:

VIII. CONCLUSION

33. The UNDP programme of assistance to the African liberation movements continues to grow and contributes to the necessary preparation of the peoples of the countries concerned before they assume the responsibilities which will be theirs when their countries are liberated.

34. In 1979, the commitment level of NLM projects against the IPF was \$6.7 million, which is 93 per cent over the 1978 implementation level of \$3.5 million. While it can be expected that there will be a shortfall in the actual implementation vis-à-vis commitments, the level of delivery can be estimated at \$5.7 million, or 63 per cent over the previous year. The current 1980 commitment level is at \$3 million, but this will soon be raised markedly in view of recently approved extensions, (see paragraph 32), and other proposals now under appraisal. As a result, it is expected that all IPF resources will be utilized by or before the end of the cycle.

35. Considering that no date has yet been fixed for the independence of Namibia, and in view of the political situation in South Africa, it is felt that additional resources will be needed for the third IPF cycle to enable UNDP to support those peoples struggling for their countries' liberation.
