UNDP field offices in Belgrade and Bucharest

Note by the Administrator

Summary

At the thirty-second session of the Governing Council, held in June 1985, the Council discussed the closing of the UNDP field offices in Belgrade and Bucharest. Since both Governments have indicated their wish to keep the offices open, the matter is referred back to the Council for a decision.

This note sets out the respective estimated costs to each of the Governments concerned and to UNDP of: (a) keeping the offices open; (b) closing the offices and administering the programmes for Romania and Yugoslavia by the UNDP office in Geneva. 1. At the thirty-second session of the Governing Council, held in June 1985, the Council discussed the closing of the UNDP field offices in Belgrade and Bucharest. There is no provision in the 1986/1987 administrative budget for the continued financing of these offices after 1 January 1987. If no action is taken to amend the budget, the offices will, therefore, be closed as of 1 January 1987.

2. The Governments of Romania and Yugoslavia have expressed their wish to keep the offices open.

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B. Summary of other factors

4. In the event of closure, the UNDP programmes in both countries would be fully administered by the Geneva office.

5. The two United Nations System agencies most affected in Romania would be the United Nations Information Centre (UNIC), since the Resident Representative acts as its Director, and the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) whose heavy workload is also currently handled by the UNDP field office. In Yugoslavia, the United Nations Fund for Population Activities (UNFPA) would be most affected in view of its large number of projects.

6. The above United Nations system agencies in the two countries would be required to make alternative arrangements for handling the administrative matters identified in annex II. In general United Nations system agencies would have to deal directly with the Governments on matters regarding the employment of nationals, the placement of fellows and the implementation of regular programme activities.

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Annex II

DETAILED ANALYSIS OF OTHER FACTORS

A. Belgrade

(a) Revised arrangements

An additional staff member will be assigned to the Geneva office and made primarily responsible for programme activities in Yugoslavia. The staff member will visit the country from time to time, as appropriate, to monitor project and programme activities. Owing to decentralized authority in Yugoslavia, the staff member will be required to hold discussions and maintain contacts on programme matters with designated officials of six Republics and two autonomous Provinces, as well as with Federal authorities of the Federal Administration for International Scientific, Educational, Cultural and Technical Cooperation (FAISECTC), the co-ordinating Ministry of UNDP activities at the central level. Since the indicative planning figure (IPF) is distributed among the various regions, the staff member will also have to monitor activities and hold discussions with the national project directors (there are no international project managers) and attend project tripartite reviews, as necessary. Since Yugoslavia provides technical assistance in five developing countries to several projects of the United Nations Capital Development Fund (UNCDF) and the United Nations Sudano-Sahelian Office (UNSO), the staff member will also be responsible for liaising with these bodies in their activities.

(b) Local presence of other United Nations offices

Apart from the UNDP office, the only other United Nations offices in Belgrade are the United Nations Information Centre (UNIC) and the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR). UNIC occupies one third of the UNDP premises in Belgrade and the UNDP local office budget covers rent, caretaker costs, maintenance and heating expenditures for the entire premises. If the office closes, the Department of Public Information (DPI) will have to cover its portion of expenditures, estimated in 1985 at 7.5 million dinars (equivalent to US\$34,883).

(c) Services affected by closure

- (i) The United Nations Fund for Population Activities (UNFPA): UNFPA will be required to ensure the local supervision of eight projects financed by it, in liaison with the Geneva office;
- (ii) Employment of Yugoslav nationals in the United Nations system agencies: the agencies in general will have to deal directly with the Government on matters dealing with the employment of Yugoslavs and the implementation of their regular programme activities in the country.

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(d) Alternative Arrangements

Alternative arrangements will need to be made for the following services of direct interest to UNIC and UNHCR:

- (i) Cost-of-living survey;
- (ii) Local salary survey (UNIC and UNHCR follow the UNDP salary scale);
- (iii) Telex (cost presently shared with UNIC);
- (iv) Pouch services to New York, Geneva, Rome and Nairobi, handled by UNDP but also used by UNIC and UNHCR;
 - (v) Daily subsistence allowance (DSA) and stipend calculations.

B. Bucharest

(a) Revised arrangements

A staff member in the Geneva office will be made responsible primarily for programme activities in Romania. The staff member will visit Romania from time to time, as appropriate, to monitor projects and programme activities and hold discussions with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, which is the co-ordinating Ministry for UNDP activities, on all matters pertaining to the UNDP programme in Romania. Discussions will also be held on sectoral matters with the technical ministries concerned. The Director or the Deputy Director of the Geneva office will visit Romania as appropriate and necessary. All correspondence on programme and project matters will be handled by the Geneva office.

(b) Local presence of other United Nations system centres

Apart from the UNDP office, the only other United Nations system centres in Bucharest are UNIC and the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), European Centre for Higher Education (CEPES). The Director of CEPES, who heads a team of six international staff, has been the Resident Representative's alternate as: (i) approving officer for UNDP; and (ii) certifying officer for UNIC.

(c) Services affected by closure

There are two important services for which other arrangements will need to be made if the field office is closed:

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- (i) The functions of the Acting Director of the UNIC office in Bucharest, which have been performed by the Resident Representative;
- (ii) A significant number of refugee matters, for which the UNDP office has been responsible. In practical terms, this involves a considerable volume of correspondence with UNHCR headquarters in Geneva.
- (d) Alternative arrangements will be required for the following services:
 - (i) Cost-of-living survey;
 - (ii) Local salary survey (UNIC follows the UNDP salary scale);
 - (iii) Telex services;
 - (iv) Pouch services;
 - (v) DSA and stipend calculations.
